### **ABOUT THE MAJOR**

The BIS Social Entrepreneurship Pathway integrates coursework from Management, Sociology, and a variety of additional disciplines to address complex social problems confronting our neighborhoods and communities. Students will learn how to combine social science and business methodologies to analyze social problems as a means of developing a holistic understanding of the causes that underpin these problems and ways of addressing them. This integrative program provides a broad foundation while allowing students to tailor their degrees to a specific area of interest. Graduates can pursue careers in community-based organizations, non-profit management, and local government agencies.

### **ABOUT THIS MAP**

The Four-Year Plan is designed only as a guide. Estimated time of completion is based on 15 hour semesters, with no summer classes.
