
Celebrating Research Outcomes from Ingram Library's Special Collections

The Origins and Consequences of Congressional Party Election Agendas by Scott R. Meinke Cambridge University Press, 2023

The Newt Gingrich papers in our archive were essential to his research for this book in which Meinke, a professor of political science at Bucknell University, sought to determine party priorities since 1980, by examining congressional party election agendas and archived records.

Scott Meinke approached Special Collections after the Centers for the Study of Congress (ACSC) Annual Meeting in 2018 to request access to the Gingrich papers.

Paulina Peavy: Astrocultural Messenger Curated by Laura Whitcomb Andrew Edlin Gallery, New York City September 14 – October 28, 2023

Paulina Peavy (1901-1999) was a fine artist who, after attending a séance in 1932, at which she claimed to have encountered a bodiless entity called Lacamo, a "UFO spirit," became publicly associated with a movement called astroculture.

The Ingo Swann papers in our collections were used in the development of this exhibition.

Recipient of the Townsend Prize for Fiction, Georgia Writers Association Lifetime Achievement, Award, and the Governor's Award in the Humanities, Terry Kay (1938-2020) was a prominent Georgian Author of 18 books, of which three were made into movies. He was also inducted into the Writers Hall of Fame.


The Georgia Writers Museum debuted this exhibit on August 10, 2023. Materials from Special Collections were used in the making of the exhibit.


Demons & Saviors Hulu Original Docuseries Released August 3, 2023

Nicknamed "Columbus Poltergeist kid," Christina Boyer is said to have possessed telekinetic powers during her trial, in which she was accused for and convicted of murdering her three-year old daughter in 1992. It is for those purported telekinetic powers that she first attracted attention in the mid-1980's. Christina maintains her innocence, and a group of supporters are calling for her exoneration.

Hulu's original series *Demons & Saviors* explores her case, and relies heavily on audio, footage, and documents from the William G. Roll papers.


Included in this book are photos, recipes, and art. Quotes from papers found in Special Collections are found throughout.

A UWG student in Computer Science, Alexander Ayers, developed a prototype application, in part using digitized images from the University Archives in Special Collections.


That work was presented on a poster in April 2023 at the National Conference on Undergraduate Research (NCUR).



Assassinations Leroy Almon Silkscreen on burlap #59 in a series 1991




Internment Refugee Camps: Historical and Contemporary Perspectives Edited by Gabriele Anderl, Linda Erker, and Christoph Reinprecht Columbia University Press, 2023

Refugee internment camps of the past and present in different historical contexts are examined in this book in order to find the parallels and differences between types of camps and practices used in different countries.

The Gregor Sebba papers in our collection were used to specifically speak to the displaced in Georgia. Sebba was a social scientist and immigrant himself.

Sebba's study was conducted at the suggestion of the Georgia Displaced Persons Committee, headed by Tom Linder, State Department of Agriculture, in order to develop proposals for future immigration programmes, and was financed by Governor Talmadge. Forrest Bess (1911-1977) was an American painter who produced extraordinary work in the mid 20th century. 

This midterm election, also known as the "Gingrich Revolution," is the starting point for a Republican push towards conservatism.




Daz Smith, who also has a passion for remote viewing, interviewed Roberts shortly before her papers were added to our collections, some of which were shown during the interview.

Newt Gingrich: The Rise and Fall of a Party Entrepreneur by Matthew N. Green and Jeffrey Crouch University Press of Kansas, 2022

Newt Gingrich, former Speaker of the House of Representatives, was first elected in 1978, but he made history when he was elected Speaker in 1994, the first Republican to hold that position in forty years.

This book takes a look at Gingrich's career using archival material, some of which is housed in the Gingrich collection here at UWG, as well as some from the Mel Steely papers, who was biographer and congressional advisor to Gingrich from 1978-1992.



The Three Death Sentences of Clarence Henderson by Chris Joyner Harry N. Abrams, Inc., 2022

Author Chris Joyner, an investigative reporter with the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*, tells the story of Clarence Henderson, a Black sharecropper who was accused of murder and sentenced to death in three different trials, as well as the stories of a recruiter for the Communist Party seeking to recruit southern African Americans and Thurgood Marshall's NAACP battling racism and Communist Party recruitment.

The social context during which these trials took place relied heavily on regional historical records found in Special Collections.



The Walls Within: The Politics of Immigration in Modern America by Sarah R. Coleman

Post-1965, immigration politics in the US changed as a result of the Hart-Celler Act, which abolished national quotas. The politics surrounding immigration has taken many forms since then, forming the roots of today's nativist sentiment.

Coleman made use of both the Newt Gingrich papers and the Mel Steely papers during her research for this book.
