

UWG's Online MBA Remains No. 1, Online Nursing Masters Degree Program Remains No. 2 in Georgia

For the third consecutive year, the University of West Georgia's online MBA program remains top in the state, as announced by media powerhouse <u>U.S. News & World Report</u>'s annual rankings.

The institution's online master's degrees in education were also noted as being among the highest-quality programs in the nation, which is no surprise, given the programs' enrollment growth and national reputation in advancing the careers of educators.

Overall online bachelor degree programs also continued to hold steady at No. 2 in the state, only bested by the University of Georgia.

The <u>nursing master's degree</u> program also was second in Georgia, behind Georgia College and State University. The publication also recognized UWG's programming in graduate education for <u>veterans</u>.

"Our commitment to the curation of a <u>first-choice university</u> demands that we offer programs that are aligned with industry and

also offer flexibility and convenience," said Dr. Brendan Kelly, UWG's <u>president</u>. "This commendation confirms that UWG has a nationally recognized academic reputation and leads the state as a university that leans into offering a high-quality, career-connected educational experience for our students."

Surveys evaluating bachelor's programs assessed more than 360 institutions across engagement, services and technology, faculty qualifications and training, and expert opinion. Similarly, the surveys examining graduate degree programs encompassed the same four criteria along with student achievement.

U.S. News utilizes rigorously verified academic data sourced from surveys and reputable third-party outlets for ranking computation, supplemented by user input, consultations with educational institutions and experts, literature assessments, analysis of existing trends, integration of new data, and interactions with deans and institutional researchers

at higher education events. Subsequently, only the most outstanding institutions are featured in the rankings.

"UWG is proud to be honored once again by U.S. News & World Report as an outstanding higher education institution," said Dr. Jon Preston, provost and senior vice president for academic affairs.
"These rankings consider many variables, so to be positioned at or near the top in various categories speaks to our commitment to providing a rigorous curriculum, a supportive learning environment and practical skills that prepare our students for success."

For more than 25 years, UWG has offered affordable and convenient online classes and serves as the administrative headquarters for the <u>University System of Georgia</u>'s <u>eCampus</u>, which includes <u>eCore</u> and <u>eMajor</u>. Collaborating with USG institutions, it delivers high-caliber <u>online</u> education programs tailored to meet the demands of national and international industries.

UWG's Tanner Health System School of Nursing (THSSON) recently named a classroom in memory of Ware, who served as associate dean and the first coordinator of the THSSON graduate program before her passing, following a generous gift by Ware's daughter, Laurie Ann Taylor.

Taylor's gift established the Dr. Laurie Jowers Ware Graduate Nursing Program Endowment, as well as naming the classroom space, both dedicated to advancing the education of future nurses.

"My mom had a remarkable bond with her students," said Taylor. "They knew they could turn to her for guidance, and she was always there to support, encourage and mentor them. This classroom is a way to keep that bond alive by carrying on her legacy of excellence and kindness."

Known for her distinctive ability to connect with students, Ware fostered a nurturing environment that allowed students to excel both academically and personally. Her efforts not only created a rigorous, student-centered curriculum but also established a community of alumni who launched prosperous careers at UWG.

Courtney Klink Gets NLN Foundation Scholarship

Courtney Klink, (EdD(c), UWG THS School of Nursing, received one of 13 National League for Nursing Foundation for Nursing Education Faculty Scholarship Awards for 2024. As a student at the UWG THS School of Nursing, Courtney was the only student at a Georgia school to receive one of these awards this year.

Advanced degree nursing students have been awarded a total of \$114,645 in financial support through the annual competitive scholarship program run by the National League for Nursing Foundation for Nursing Education.

There are 13 recipients of foundation scholarships of up to \$8,000 each.

"We are proud to sponsor another year of scholarship support to deserving students enrolled in advanced degree programs who are committed to pursuing careers in nursing education. Join the 2025 Study Abroad Nursing

UWG THS School of Nurisng students, join us for the 2025 Study Abroad program.

Program Description

Within a quality caring framework, this course will provide the student with a broad overview of global, public, and community health care and health care systems with a particular focus on the region surrounding Foligno, Italy. Through this experience, students will be able to explore the impact of community and culture on the health of individuals. Students will examine issues such as access to health care as well as current global, public, and community health trends, issues, policies, and practices within the context of a hands-on experiential learning opportunity.

In this experience, students will engage with the rich history and culture of Foligno and the surrounding areas to experience learning about nursing and healthcare care from a community, public, and global health perspective. The program will occur during the time in which other UWG study abroad experiences are happening in Italy. These overlapping programs will allow students to learn with and among students and faculty in other academic disciplines, enhancing the learning of all students. This course and program will not look like a typical classroom, as you will have real-world interactions with the Italian healthcare system through experiential and service-focused activities.

Special Requirements

To participate in the program, students must enroll in NURS4486.

Participation requires **one** of the following:

- Currently accepted or enrolled in a bachelor's or graduate-level nursing course
- Currently accepted to and enrolled in any bachelor's or graduate-level community health and wellness course
- An active and valid CNA certificate in any state
- An active and valid RN license in any state
- An active and valid EMT or Paramedic license/certification in any state
- Validated military experience as a medic or corpsman

*Students may apply while they are completing their CNA, EMT, or Paramedic programs but must complete and obtain the certification or licensure by February 15, 2025. Program participants must be 18 years of age at the time of the trip and have an overall GPA of 2.5.

Costs and Deadlines

The total program charge of \$3900 is due in three installments with the following deadlines:

- Non-refundable deposit of \$100 due December 1
- First Payment of \$1000 due **December 1**
- Second Payment of \$2000 due February 1
- Final Payment of remainder due March 1

If a student decides to pay through Touchnet, they must be aware that there is a 3% non-refundable applicable fee to each payment.

Not included in program fee ETIAS Visa Waiver Fee (Travel

Permit)- This fee may range at about \$10.00 but is subject to change. Students are responsible for securing their visa. The inability to travel due a lack of visa/passport will result in the complete loss of the program fee.

A record number of UWG THS School of Nursing students and faculty received DAISY awards this years.

Devoted to DAISYs: UWG Nursing Students Earn Esteemed DAISY Award

The <u>DAISY Foundation</u> awarded the <u>DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses</u> to three University of West Georgia <u>Tanner Health System School of Nursing (THSSON)</u> students who exemplify compassion and excellence in nursing – Kristie Gardner '23, Dejah Shipman '24 and Emily Powell '24.

Patients, family members, faculty and others who observe or experience exceptional care from nursing professionals nominate DAISY candidates who epitomize the qualities needed to excel as a nurse.

Powell and Shipman received nominations from Wellstar Health System for fulfilling these outstanding roles as healthcare professionals.

Powell suffered through an extensive sickness that resulted in two missed years of high school and, after a carousel of hospital visits, discovered her calling as a nurse.

"When I got sick, I went to multiple doctors, sat throughout countless tests and was put on endless rotations of different medications," said Powell. "At 15, I knew I never wanted anyone to experience what I'd gone through. I believe it was my calling to nursing." Shipman understood her passion as she went from playing "dress up" as a nurse to wearing real scrubs as an RN.

Despite their varying backgrounds, these instances inspired these UWG students to provide countless patients with intentional, above-and-beyond care, resulting in the coveted DAISY Award.

Gardner experienced significant loss after caring for both her father and adopted son, who both passed away in 2016 and 2019, respectively.

After experiencing such significant grief, I felt lost and without purpose," explained Gardner. "Through this suffering, my purpose to become a nurse became ignited. In 2021, I started my journey with the UWG nursing program and graduated with a bachelor's degree in nursing in December 2023."

These nurses acknowledge the significance of the DAISY Award and express deep appreciation for being recognized with such an admirable accolade.

"This award is one of the biggest honors a nurse can have," said Shipman. "To me, the DAISY Award means dedication, compassion and kindness, down to the little things others may overlook."

Gardner expressed similar sentiments. "Receiving the DAISY Award is a tremendous honor," said Gardner. "Winning this award set a standard for me as a nurse by treating each patient as if they were my family member by

taking the time to make a connection, offering a smile and words of encouragement, and truly listening."

All three students praise THSSON as a vessel to achieve their accomplishments.

"UWG's nursing program has been a big part of my life," said Powell. "This program helped me accomplish my dream of becoming a nurse. I've met some great people and professors throughout my time there and wouldn't trade it for anything."


